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
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Inside the Texas Revolution: The Enigmatic Memoir of Herman Ehrenberg is a product of the translation skills of the late Louis E. Brister with the assistance of James C. Kearney, both noted specialists on Germans in Texas. The volume's editor, James E. Crisp, has spent much of the last 27 years solving many of the mysteries that still surrounded Ehrenberg's life. Ehrenberg was not a historian, but an ordinary citizen whose narrative of the Texas Revolution contains both spectacular eyewitness accounts and almost mythologized versions of major events that he did not witness himself. This volume points out where Ehrenberg is lying or embellishing, explains why he is doing so, and narrates the actual relevant facts as far as they can be determined. Ehrenberg's book is both a testament by a young Texan "everyman" who presents a laudatory paean to the Texan cause, and a German's

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
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
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
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
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







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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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








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


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The tremendous growth of the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex from the 19th through 21st centuries far outpaced the recorded history of this economically vital area. Texas is often associated with its rural ranching history, yet as the decades passed, the cultural and economic identities of the Lone Star State evolved to reflect the increasing importance and influence of the urban areas. No area in Texas illustrates this transformation better than DFW—a well-traveled location during the cattle trailing and early railroad eras that blossomed into a modern financial and cultural hotspot in the present day. We need a more complete documentation of the DFW metroplex, and the Texas State Historical Association (TSHA) seeks to correct this imbalance in the historical record. However, only about 1,000 current *Handbook of Texas* entries (approximately 3%) focus primarily on the DFW metroplex. TSHA seeks to add and revise 1,000 entries through this new special project, the *Handbook of Dallas/Fort Worth*.

Significant support from the Summerlee Foundation, the Rees-Jones Fund at the Dallas Foundation, Amon G. Carter Foundation, Summerfield G. Roberts Foundation, and the Tarrant County Historical Society has allowed the hiring of a dedicated TSHA assistant editor and part-time graduate research assistants at Texas Christian University and the University of Texas at Austin to assist with researching, writing, and fact-checking entries, which significantly increase the pace of the project.

The Handbook of Dallas-Fort Worth project is led by TSHA Chief Historian Dr. Walter L. Buenger and Project Director Dr. Michael V. Hazel, a Dallas scholar and author, with support from Handbook Managing Editor Dr. Brett J. Derbes and Handbook Assistant Editor Russell Stites.

Norman Washington Harllee, by Marvin Dulaney

Norman Washington Harllee was an African American educator who served as a teacher, principal, and supervisor of public schools in Dallas for more than forty years. In January 1927 the city of Dallas honored N. W. Harllee for his forty-one years of service to Dallas's public schools and the Dallas community by renaming the Ninth Ward School where he had served as principal in his honor. Harllee became the first living person and the first African American in Dallas to have a school named for him.

Francisco "Pancho" Medrano, labor and civil rights leader, son of Sabas Medrano and Nicolasa Ruiz Franco, was born in the Little Mexico neighborhood of Dallas, Texas, on August 2, 1920. Medrano took an active role, not only in his home state, but in significant civil rights events across the country, including Martin Luther King, Jr.'s marches in Selma and Birmingham, Alabama, and demonstrations by Cesar Chavez.

Dallas LGBT community, by Sam Childers


Early documentation of gay and lesbian people in Dallas is virtually nonexistent. There is little scholarly work on LGBT history in Dallas and few primary sources are known to exist. By 2021 Dallas had one of the largest LGBT communities in the country, and gay men and lesbians were woven into the fabric of civic life.

Effectively telling the story of LGBT (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender) life in Fort Worth and Tarrant County is a challenge for many reasons, the biggest obstacle being a slow transformation from unspoken secrecy to gradual acceptance and community visibility. In 2011 in a historic move celebrating thirty years of LGBT Pride, the annual parade for the first time proceeded down Main Street in downtown Fort Worth as a testament to how far the city's LGBT community had come.

Barefoot Sanders, by Darwin Payne

Harold Barefoot Sanders, Jr., federal district judge, state legislator, and long-time Democratic official, son of H. B. Sanders, Sr., and Mary Elizabeth (Forrester) Sanders, was born on February 5, 1925, in Dallas, Texas. On November 22, 1963, Sanders and his wife were riding a few automobiles behind the president in his motorcade through downtown Dallas when the president was shot and killed and Texas governor John Connally was wounded. From 1989 to 1995 Sanders served as chief judge of the Northern District of Texas. In 1996 he took senior status and retired at the age of eighty-one in 2006.

Helen Corbitt, by Judy Alter

Helen Lucy Corbitt, American chef, cookbook author, and the doyenne of food service at Neiman Marcus in Dallas, was born in Benson Mines, New York, to Henry James Corbitt and Eva (Marshall) Corbitt on January 25, 1906. Corbitt joined the staff of the University of Texas at Austin where she ran the University Tea Room and taught quantity cooking and restaurant management. Stanley Marcus of Dallas's famed Neiman Marcus specialty store began "courting" Corbitt in 1949 with a telegram offering her a thousand dollars a month, along with an undetermined bonus at year's end and some participation in the profits from the catering business. Helen Corbitt was at Neiman Marcus only fourteen years. While there, she gave lectures and conducted occasional cooking classes, notably one for select businessmen that met in her apartment.

Etta Hulme, by Samantha Dodd

Etta Grace Parks Hulme was one of the first woman political cartoonists in the United States and one of the first women to join the Association of American Editorial Cartoonists (AAEC). Etta Hulme began to draw editorial cartoons in 1954 and submitted her first work to the *Texas Observer*. In search of cartooning work, Etta submitted samples of her work to the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* and made "a nuisance" of herself until the *Star-Telegram* agreed to print some of her work on a freelance basis. By 1981 Hulme was still one of only three women editorial cartoonists in the nation. She served as the first woman president of the Association of American Editorial Cartoonists (AAEC) in 1987. Etta Hulme's final editorial cartoon appeared in the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* in December 2008.




